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No stress home buying At Silverstream

The day Essence interviewed volunteer firefighter Assina Dalglish of Swannanoa, a forestry fire was raging on the other side of the Waimakariri River, in Kirwee. It would eventually wipe out 80ha of forest, scrub and farmland but the efforts of the firefighters in attendance would thankfully mean that no homes or lives were lost in the blaze.

Whilst Assina wasn't on call for the Kirwee fire, she knows first-hand the devastation that fires like this one can wreak. As a member of the Swannanoa Volunteer Fire Brigade, the 26-year-old has attended her fair share of significant call outs in the past three years, including the Loburn and Swannanoa fires in January as well as car accidents, natural disasters and medical events

"It's hard at times but it's all part of the job," says Assina, with her trademark pragmatism. "You do some really late nights and weekends. It's hot, it's hard going, but I always think no matter what you're turning up to, it's probably somebody's worst day. The worst day of their life. By turning up and doing something anything - to help, we can only make that day a little better.

It's this focus on helping people that drove Assina to apply for the brigade back in 2021. "I've always enjoyed helping people out. As a kid I was a St. John cadet, and I grew up wanting to join the army. Having my son changed that, so firefighting became my way of helping people and serving the community."

With a waitlist in place, joining the Swannanoa Volunteer Fire Brigade isn't a walk in the park. After a Q&A with the senior officers, Assina had to undergo a six-month probation and training period, followed by the toughest part of the selection process: "At the end of your probation the crew take a vote to see who wants you on board. It sounds harsh, but it's such a team-oriented thing so it's really important that you all gel well."

Luckily, Assina got the nod and jumped straight in to attending weekly training evenings and regular call outs which can involve anything from driving huge fire appliances to being on the hoses, stabilising vehicles involved in accidents or attending to patients in a medical emergency

Unsurprisingly, when you're going through all of that with a band of 26 other volunteers, you become close, fast

"Before I joined the brigade I didn't really know anyone in the area. As soon as I joined it was like I had a second family," says Assina. "I even met my partner Ben here. It's such a great community of people and they're always there to help. That's probably what I love the most about it."

Although she's parenting her young son, studying full time, working seasonally and volunteering with the brigade, 26-year-old Assina somehow also manages to train for and enter competitive events with other firefighters like the Auckland Skytower Challenge and the United Fire Brigades' Association Firefighting Challenge - a gruelling physical event that

has been dubbed "the toughest two minutes in sport"

Whilst the thought of that competition alone would frighten the best of us, Assina says she isn't phased by the competition or by the life-threatening emergencies she faces on a regular basis. "I don't really get scared

and I think that's because we have a lot of training behind us. I feel very competent at what I do, and I know that I have all these safety protocols behind me so I'm always very focused on the job at hand. You have processes to work through, so you just work through it and do the job."





Fire Safety

What Can Rural Families Do to Help Safeguard Against Vegetation Fires?

• Visit checkitsalright.nz. This is a super handy tool that tells you if it's safe to light a fire at your place, or not, such as during a total fire ban as we have seen this summer. It also has a lot of information on fire safety that families can use.

2. Make sure your driveway has adequate space for a fire appliance. This means a space of 4m wide by 4m under trees and growth surrounding driveways. If we can't get our vehicle in, or can't open the doors once we're there, this can delay access to your emergency, which could be life threatening.

 ${f 3.}$ Consider what you plant around your home. Although it sounds small, having green spaces around your house and plants that are good fire breaks can make all the difference by slowing an approaching fire and allowing crews valuable time to get to it. We saw this a lot at the Loburn fires. There is good information about low flammability plants on checkitsalright.nz under 'Reduce your Risk'.



Are auctions back?!

As the market improves, more and more sellers are turning back to auction as the best method for them to sell their property. We felt it was the perfect time to talk about what it takes to get ready to bid at auction in case you are new to the process. We appreciate this can appear to be quite a daunting task but if you know what you're doing it's the most transparent and informed way to buy property in the market today.

Once you identify that you like the look of an auction property the first thing to understand is that bidding is on a cash and unconditional basis. In other words you complete your due diligence prior to bidding at auction instead of once you make an offer. To assist with this you will generally find the seller provides you with a Property Information pack which will include a LIM, Title, EQC information, insurance information and more often that not a Building Inspection - which is great!

It is then really important that you work closely with the listing salesperson, your bank, your insurer and your solicitor to review this information - we suggest following a process like

• Register your interest & obtain a copy of the auction pack

If you are interested in the property be sure to let the sales consultant who showed you the home know. This ensures that if another buyer makes a pre auction offer and the owners accept that offer, then the sales consultant is able to contact all interested parties.

• Have the Title, Land Information Memorandum (LIM) and Particulars and Conditions of Sale approved by your



- Have your finances arranged to coincide with the date of settlement and possession. Also make sure you are able to pay a 10% deposit on the fall of the hammer by electronic bank transfer.
- Speak with an insurance company to make sure you can obtain insurance on the property from the settlement date if you are the successful purchase
- Request any variations to the Particulars and Conditions of Sale by way of an Aside Agreement. Such variations must be discussed with your sales consultant prior to auction day. They will then seek the seller's approval
- You will need to complete and sign an Auction Bidding Registration and Consent By Purchaser' form prior to bidding This form will be in the property information pack but your sales consultant will provide one upon request.

The blind trust of **Property Management!**

I was reading an article recently about someone who had purchased a rent roll believing that the sole charge property manager was doing a good job and ensuring the properties complied with legislation, however upon delving deeper this was far from the truth.

This got me thinking about how much an active supervisory role in a property management business is imperative to ensuring shortcuts are not being taken and that the landlord's assets are protected.

I wish I could be confident in saying that all property managers are created equally, but that is not always the case unfortunately, and until regulation is re-introduced, inferior property management will continue to be out there destroying the name of our profession.

So, what should you be looking for? If you have not been asked to supply a healthy homes report, smoke alarm and insurance information, your property is likely not compliant with current legislation. There are many boxes to tick and all new tenancy agreements and renewals must have these details recorded, so why haven't you been asked? Although we know that sometimes we have to deliver news landlords don't like hearing, it is our responsibility to ensure our landlords are protected from any potential fines whilst ensuring our tenants are living in healthy, safe and compliant homes.

Does the company have an externally audited trust account? Who is ensuring that everything is above board, that bonds are being lodged on time, and of course that payments are going where they should be? It's surprising how many landlords don't check their accounts regularly.

Are you receiving thorough inspection reports to ensure compliance with your insurance policy? Are maintenance requests and recommendations being sent to you?

And finally where does the buck stop, who can you call if you are not happy or have concerns?



Anyway I thought it was food for thought and as a property investor myself I see these things as the absolute minimum when choosing a property manager to take care of your rental properties.

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TELLING TALES OF Rural Life

On a late summer morning looking out over a garden with rambling roses, vigorous vines and established trees - it's hard to imagine that seven years ago this was a bare paddock. But that's exactly what it was says homeowner Sue Heazlewood.

The first task in the garden was creating an edible garden. "I saw something similar in a movie and I thought I'd like something similar," she explains. It also gave her the benefit of having a small area to focus on initially rather than being overwhelmed by the size of the project. Although, hard work and large projects aren't things that seem to trouble Sue. A mother of six grown up children, former property developer and author of the successful Tangleby books - she is a whirlwind of undaunted energy.

Originally from Cheviot, Sue lived for several years in Christchurch but always longed to return to rural life. When her eldest son. Adam, spotted this house on the market he thought it was perfect for her - he was right.

Fast forward several years and Sue has truly made the modern house a home for herself and her partner, Don. There are comfortable couches, a white grand piano and a French dining table under a modern chandelier-style light. Whilst touches of gold show up in the baroque style frames of paintings and burnt orange accents in the cushions and dining chairs. It's exuberant in its gleaming colours.

So how would Sue describe her interior design style?

"Formal rustic," she replies without a pause. "I don't want a house where am tiptoeing around or am worried when grandchildren come over."

But it was the garden, the rural setting and the creatures that she came across that inspired her first book – Tails of Tangleby Gardens. "I was in the garden and I had been watching these skylarks and I just started thinking about talking animals," she recalls. The book also includes simple recipes for children to make.

"I've always loved cooking," she says. "When my six children were growing up there was a huge amount of cooking. I would always write the dinner menu on the kitchen splashback so they wouldn't keep asking what was for dinner. And on a Sunday I would give them three choices for their school lunchboxes."

That first book took Sue just six months to write and was published in 2022. Since then she has written and published three other books - a second children's book and two grown up cookbooks - including A

Table At Tangleby which recently won the Entertainment Category in the Gourmand Best in the World Cookbook Awards

But this is not overnight success, says partner Don. Together they work endlessly on the books - checking online orders, keeping up with comments and feedback on social media and talking to distributors, going to food shows and producing online content. And, on top of this, Don is also working on his own book which looks at the history of the Havelock District.

Meanwhile Sue is always trying different recipes, making notes and making short cooking videos for their social media channels. She films them in the light, bright and meticulously tidy kitchen at her home but whilst the cooking comes easily to her, she has had to build her confidence at making videos.

"When she first started filming I wasn't even allowed in the house at the same time," says Don good naturedly.

Whilst awards might be exciting, it's not what keeps Sue and Don working. They love what they're doing and the feedback from customers is heartwarming. They hear from grandparents who read the stories





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feels good they say.

Sue has three more books due to be published over the coming year. And the couple have also developed some other products around the Tangleby books - a pair of soft toy rabbits based on characters in the books, Marmalade and Montgomery; measuring spoons for baking; a digital thermometer and a digital measuring spoon. Whilst this Easter they are also organising an Easter Egg Hunt at Tangleby Gardens.

On the way out Sue points to a bed of colourful dahlias. "Dahlias are my latest obsession," she says. "A few months ago that was just lawn, now there are 120 types of dahlia planted there."

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
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Make your home cozy this winter

With North Canterbury enjoying a long hot Summer it probably seems strange to start talking about insulating your home for winter. But now is the best time to consider the options for window furnishings to help make your home cozy this winter, well ahead of the first signs of autumn.

BRANZ, an independent research organisation, says:

42% to 45% of heat in houses insulated to pre-2007 requirements is lost through windows.

If your home has been built or renovated under the 2007 Building Code, which requires double glazing, you still lose up to 31% of heat through windows.

Properly fitted drapes and blinds can cut heat loss through single glazed windows by 60% and double glazed windows by 40-50%.

Choosing the right window treatments will help insulate windows and prevent heat loss. Here are three options to answer your "how can I warm up my home?" this winter.

Thermacell Blinds, or honeycomb blinds, are one of the most energy-efficient window treatments available. These window coverings feature a honeycomb structure to make an air pocket between the window glass and the room that acts as an insulator, blocking heat and keeping the cold out.



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Drapes or curtains are another way to insulate your home by adding one extra barrier against the cold winter air. The main difference is that curtains are sized to fit the window, and drapes reach the floor.

Their ability to reduce heat loss depends on the size of the area covered, fitting, fabric type and colour. With such a wide variety available, it's tricky to talk about each fabric's efficiency. But based on different consumer reports from all over the world medium-coloured drapes with white lining have been proven to prevent up to 33% of heat loss.

An additional tip to reduce heat loss is that your draperies should be hung as close to windows as possible and fall onto a windowsill or floor.

Curtains over blinds

More and more kiwis prefer to combine blinds and curtains to get the best from both worlds. First, two coverings can work together to create a better look for your interior. Secondly, you will keep more heat inside your home, as multiple layers mean better insulation.

Home Office with a view

Many of us work from home at some point, whether it's a day a week or full-time. We might spread out on the corner of the kitchen table or take our laptop to the spare bedroom. But architectural designer, Josh Newlove, has created a home office that ticks all the boxes - great views of Mt Peel, close to the house, but far enough away to avoid disturbances.

It sounds pretty swish but Josh built the space entirely himself all from recycled materials, seeking out bargains on Trade Me and Marketplace and doing most of the work himself.

"I love coming up with new ideas and experimenting," says Josh. "And Dad is a builder so I grew up around building."

this home office.

Of course, using recycled materials can create some restrictions – for instance the size of the office was decided by the three sheets of play that he had for the floor. But it doesn't mean a compromise in quality - the office is fully insulated, all the rafters are exposed and are one continuous beam from inside to out and there's a 20mm plywood eave. The door is

painted a bright yellow (Resene Bright Spark) to match the yellow kitchen in the main house. And, of course, there's wi-fi internet and power. The space is versatile and could be used for other things - such as a sleepout or extra living space as the family grows up.

All up the total cost of creating this office has been around \$5000 estimates Josh, although obviously that has not included his own labour.

Like many of us Josh got a taste of working from home during Covid –it was a steep learning curve he says. But now he likes to divide his time between the buzz of the NB Architect office in Timaru and his own home office which he finds is a good space for focused, creative work. "It's nice to be able to work for a while then go into the garden, do something in the veggie plot and have a break," he says.

So what are Josh's tips for others looking to create a similar home office? Well, keep things on the smaller side, if it's less than 10 square metre it doesn't need a consent but does need to be built to building code. Get some advice from a builder or designer and use recycled materials where you can to save on costs and save good materials from going to landfill. And location is key – you want to be able to tap into power and wi-fi from your house and be near enough to pop in and get a cup of coffee but far enough to get some quiet time.

Turn off the highway to Waikuku Beach and there's an instant holiday vibe in the air. Perhaps it's the sea air and the picnicking families. Or the fish and chips and the beautiful views over the lagoon.

Whatever it is – Waikuku has long been a holiday favourite with Cantabrians as Charlie and Sue Hand can confirm. The couple spend a lot of time in their Waikuku bach with their scotty dog Clyde. But it was Charlie's grandfather, Percy, that originally built 'Barrington Lodge' bach some 92 years ago - helped by Charlie's dad, Raymond (Ray), who was then a teenager.

Charlie's grandfather and father used to catch the train to Kaiapoi from Christchurch and then hop on their bicycles to cover the final stretch to the bach.

"It was only the second bach to be built in this street," says Charlie. "Back then it was just sand roads."





Charlie's grandfather started work on it during the depression when new building materials were both hard to come by and expensive. So a great deal of recycled materials were used to create the bach the porch used to have no windows, just shutters recalls Charlie and there was chicken wire at the top by the roof to provide ventilation. The shed was built from flattened out corrugated iron (it's still standing and you can see the faint waves in its wall showing its origins).

It might have been built by hand with recycled materials, but it has really stood the test of time. It's perhaps part testament to the skills of Charlie's grandfather, who was a joiner, and perhaps in part to the quality and durability of those second-hand materials.

The bach has been in the Hand family ever since it was built and Charlie has many happy memories of childhood summers spent here. "We all used to come out for a few weeks at Christmas and then my dad would often go back to Christchurch and work and we would stay. We used to practically live on the beach. And I often used to sleep up there," he says gesturing towards an old tree house tucked up in the gnarled macrocarpas.

Whilst the bach has retained much of its original porch is now a bedroom and there are windows now instead of shutters and the chicken wire is long gone. Inside the lounge area used to be double as beds and original floorboards.

It's also expanded. The kitchen door used to mark the end of the bach. But now there's a little corridor, a bunk room, a shower and a toilet. Previously there used to be a tin bath and the family used to park the car in what is now the bathroom says Charlie. There's also a whole extra sleeping area in the form of a new cabin placed at the end of the existing bach. It was put in place ready built and provides a handy extra bedroom when friends and family sleep over.

Despite these changes – the bach has stayed true to its roots as a family getaway. This is no prissy modern holiday home. The wooden floors and cladding are original. A small wooden cabinet has stood in the main room long enough to carry the watermark from a 1953 flood that washed through the beach settlement. And the walls are hung with photos of the family - there's even one of the bach being built, all faces smiling with pride as their work progressed.



Halian-inspired warm steak salad

Happy New Year, Wow! What an amazing summer we've had so far. The weather has been perfect for those days at the beach, picnics at the river and family BBQ's. There's still plenty of summer left for entertaining whether that be with friends or family or something a bit more intimate this months' recipe is perfect.

We're making a Italian-Inspired Warm Steak Salad, another popular recipe from our New World Recipe Collection.

This salad is so easy to make and with the addition of Basil Pesto certainly adds to the flavour. Use your favourite steak, we went with rump, certainly value for money and tenderising it with the rolling pin certainly does the trick. Cook it medium/rare about 1 -1/2 minutes either side and most important rest it for a few minutes before you slice it. Choose the smallest new potatoes you can find as they look great whole. The addition of rocket also gives the salad a nice peppery flavour. If you don't have any pine nuts in the cupboard substitute with some toasted walnuts. Perfect hot or cold and any leftovers are great the next day.

Ingredients

- 500g rump steak • 1kg new season baby potatoes
- 2 Tbsp basil pesto
- 1 bag of rocket
- Handful of shaved parmesan
- Optional: 1 bag of pine nuts

Method

- 1. Remove fat and gristle from the rump steak. Place the steak between two pieces of baking paper and bash with a rolling pin until it's about 1cm thick – this will tenderize the steak. Season the meat well and set aside.
- 2. Boil the potatoes for 10 12 minutes, or until fork tender.
- 3. Once the potatoes are cooked, drain and toss in half the pesto. Put aside with lid still on.
- 4. Grill the steak for 1 minute each side over a direct high heat on the BBQ. Put aside to rest for a few minutes.
- 5. Spread the remaining pesto onto a large sharing platter followed by layers of rocket and potatoes.
- 6. Thinly slice the steak at an angle, place onto platter topped with shaved parmesan

Top tip: sprinkle a handful of toasted pine nuts on top of your salad for extra crunch.





On the couch with Author Jenny Lynch

Author Jenny Lynch is a former editor of the NZ Woman's Weekly. She has been an actor, a photographic model and a Playboy bunny and lived and worked in the USA, Canada and Australia. And she's written four non-fiction books. Now in her 80s she has just written her first novel. The Secrets They Kept which is loosely based on a real life story her grandmother told her many years ago.

We got to ask her a few questions about work, writing and routines.

essence: You have had such an interesting and varied career. But we wondered what your very first job was and what you feel you learnt from it?

My first job was as a junior with the NZ Woman's Weekly. I had just returned to NZ from an American Field Service scholarship in the USA where I had studied journalism. I was 18 and wet behind the ears, but editor, Jean Wishart, was prepared to give me a chance. I spent two years on the magazine learning the basics of feature writing. I'll never forget my first interview. I was under prepared and consequently terrified. It taught me the importance of researching your subject properly beforehand. I left the magazine in 1959 and worked on four other publications before returning to the Weekly in 1976.

essence: How long were you editor of NZ Woman's Weekly and what were the biggest challenges in the role?

I was editor from 1987 to 1994, having been assistant editor since 1977. Initially my big challenge was to restore circulation after popular editor, Jean Wishart, retired in 1985 and readers had responded negatively to her replacement. That challenge became bigger in 1989 with the arrival of two Australian magazines boasting far greater resources than we had. They introduced a cult of celebrity. This was at odds with our more family friendly ethos. It soon became clear, however, that readers had an appetite for gossip, glitz and glamour and with much reluctance I had to adjust our focus. In 1991 the Weekly claimed a 'first' with pictures of Rachel Hunter's marriage to Rod Stewart. And we achieved this

without having to resort to the cheque-book journalism our Australian competitors had brought with them. Bidding for stories flew in the face of integrity and fairness and I found this development utterly deplorable.

essence: What was the biggest challenge of writing your recently released novel?

It was centred on a mystery. I needed to build tension. The final sentence of each chapter had to provide a clue designed to keep the reader wanting to know more.

essence: You have said previously that the whole plot just came to you one day out of the blue. But did you have any schedule for your writing?

I had no particular routine. I worked on the manuscript over many months. adding material and developing the various characters. Eventually those characters became as real to me as anyone I had ever known. I completed several drafts before submitting the final version to the publisher

essence: Any top tips for aspiring writers - fiction or non-fiction? Make every word count. Unless you are tackling historical fiction where research is vital, you should write about the world you know. I could never have set Secrets on a high country station much as I have enjoyed visiting Erewhon and others. You should also seek an independent assessment of your work. Don't get relatives to do it. They'll think it is the best thing since sliced bread. Welcome constructive criticism. Writers can get so close to their subject they can't see the woods for the trees. Fresh eyes can penetrate those woods.

The beauty of the Charcoal BBQ

There's a lot to be said for the typical gas BBQ – it starts up quickly, the temperature is easy to control and it saves on the pots and pans. And cooking outdoors is fun - especially in summertime.

But if you really want to make an occasion of your BBQ then it's worth thinking about the charcoal option. They're readily available at all the usual stores and whilst they may take a little more time to heat up and require a little more attention - they do give a very special flavour to whatever you might be cooking.

Someone who knows all about cooking with charcoal are the three South American chefs, Hector Meneses, Ignacio Riveros and Carlos Calisto, who form Asado. The trio specialise in cooking, well, asado. So what is that exactly?

Hector explains that 'asado' is the Argentine term for barbecue – where the meat is cooked on a grill or over hot coals and firewood for a long time. It requires skill, time and patience and should not be rushed. In South America, 'asado' also refers to a backyard barbecue with family and friends. People gather, enjoy a wine or a good beer and something to eat, and socialise outdoors while the food is slowly cooked

When it comes to the type of meat Hector advises that the most commonly used cuts in Argentina and Chile are short ribs, flank steak, skirt steak, chorizo and of course sirloin and rib eye steak. "New Zealand has very good quality venison meat too," he says. "Venison is not a very common cut in South America but most Kiwis love it and that is why it is a fundamental part of our events. New Zealanders love pork belly too, especially when we get that crispy skin."

If you're trying this yourself at home, you need to think about the type of wood you use for your BBQ. "Asado New Zealand use manuka," says Hector. "It is great because it gives us a very good ember and a good temperature. in addition, the flavour it leaves in the meat is not overpowering."

Seasoning the meat is also key and when it comes to cooking time the length of time needed on the BBQ really depends on what you're cooking advise Hector. "A 300gm sirloin or rib eye steak can take up to 15 minutes to achieve a good medium rare to medium, while the pork belly and the





whole baby back ribs that we cook take up to three hours. with soft and even embers.

To serve the meat the best sauce is chimichurri says Hector and as for how to make it, well he says Ignacio the Pit Master at Asado New Zealand makes a great one!

If all this sounds complicated then Asado New Zealand can come out and take care of the whole thing for you. Essence Magazine publisher Dorothy recently experienced this when her husband celebrated a birthday at home. Usually one to cater for guests, this time they called the guys at Asado who kept the guests fed with true South American style.

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Nefertiti Neck Lift

The Nefertiti neck lift can be a really effective way to redefine your jawline and neck to give it a tighter, wrinkle free look. 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HOT ROD LIFE

For Danny Bisschop, a chance encounter at the traffic lights as a boy sparked his life-long love of cars. "I was sitting in my parents' car when I was about 10 years old," recalls Danny, now 70. "I saw a 1933 Ford Coupe pull up at the lights and that was it! From that point on I've been crazy about hot rods."

Little did young Danny know, but he would go on to own that very car - buying it, tinkering with it and flicking it on three times before it ended up in its final resting place as a showpiece in a collector's shed

That's the thing with Danny – he's not just a panel beater, automotive painter and mechanic: he's a true blue car enthusiast. He happily recalls the history of each car he's owned over the past five decades. He knows where they started their life, who he bought them from, what he did to improve them and where they went next. It's not just a hobby, it's an all-out passion.

"It's just in my blood," he explains.

Unsurprisingly, Danny and his wife Lavina are regular attendees at car shows up and down the country. Danny checks out the cars and Lavina dresses up in her 1950s rock'n'roll attire, but there's much more to it than that.

"We do it because of the people. The cars are just the means to bring us all together, but the best part is catching up with friends, and spending time with likeminded people. We love it."

Over the years, the couple have brought home a number of trophies from the shows, but Danny says the most meaningful one is the MTF Participant's Choice Award he received at the 2023 Caroline Bay Rock & Hop for his 1952 Ford Twin Spinner

"It was such a shock!" he recalls. "The quality of the vehicles at the Rock & Hop is incredible, so for the other participants

There's basically not one original panel left because I altered everything."

Danny and Lavina are heading back to the Caroline Bay Rock & Hop this year, but the Twin Spinner will have to stay in the garage. "We're taking the Mercury Medalist this year," he explains.



As the only known 1958 Medalist in the Southern Hemisphere, chances are high it could take out a trophy too. But for Danny and Lavina, that's not what the trip is about. "The Caroline Bay Rock & Hop is such a well-organised event. The organisers have really listened to the people and made improvements over the years. They've got it pretty well stitched up now. We're really looking forward to it.'

I applaud their efforts and hope other subdivisions and communities are inspired to follow the same example.

This has been a real collaborative effort so well done to Wendy for starting the initial project and overseeing the fundraising, and to the community for getting behind her. It was lovely to hear that as the first camera was being installed, and almost exactly one year since the theft, Wendy was contacted by the police to say her motorhome had been found. A great result for a great resident!

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
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
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


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
